

PE

PE takes place every Tuesday (indoor) and Wednesday (outdoor). On these days, children will be expected to attend school in their PE kit, which consists of navy blue shorts, a pale blue polo shirt and their normal school jumper/cardigan.

Block 1

In block 1 we have explored how laws, punishment and justice have evolved across different historical periods, focusing on **power**, **consequences** and **fairness**. From the brutal punishments of the Tudor era to the establishment of modern laws, we've examined how people's ideas about justice have changed and how those in power have shaped these ideas.

We've linked this across the curriculum, drawing detailed portraits that reflect emotions. We've also made connections in science, looking at how discoveries (like electricity) brought about new laws for safety. These crosscurricular connections have helped us think deeply about the concepts of right and wrong and what makes a just society!

Block 2

In our upcoming block, through the themes of injustice, sustainability and responsibility, we'll be exploring the question: What will tomorrow's world look like? We'll dive into these big ideas by reading Maria's Island by Victoria Hislop, which tells the story of a community impacted by leprosy and the challenges they face on the island of Spinalonga.

Through our reading, we'll discuss concepts of fairness, isolation and how communities respond to illness, leading us to a balanced argument on the topic - should lepers be allowed to leave Spinalonga? This will help us consider both sides of complex issues and develop our skills in presenting a well-rounded viewpoint.

Reading

Reading is the key to academic success! As well as immersing children into different imaginative worlds, it enriches their vocabulary and comprehension skills!

Reading every day will ensure your child makes progress. Please support the development of our amazing independent readers and ensure your child reads for around 20 minutes per evening, recording this in their reading record.

Never read to: 4,662 words

1-2 times per week: 63,570 words

3-5 times per week: 169,520 words

Daily: 296,660 words

Five books a day: 1,483,300 words
