

This year, as we aim to be more inquisitive, we have been named Amelia Earhart class.


Amelia Earhart was a pioneering aviator whose boundless curiosity drove her to explore the skies at a time when few women dared to do so. From a young age, she was fascinated by adventure and exploration, constantly questioning the world around her and seeking new experiences. Her inquisitive nature led her to aviation, where she relentlessly pursued knowledge and skills, ultimately becoming the first woman to fly solo across the Atlantic. Earhart's curiosity didn't just fuel her own ambitions; it inspired generations to push beyond the boundaries of what was thought possible.

Block 1: World War 2

Who has the power to change the world?

We will spend this block considering the above question and exploring the concepts of **power**, **responsibility** and **prejudice** as we delve into our learning of World War 2.

We will explore the causes, major events and outcomes of World War 2 in our history lessons. In writing, we will compose diary entries as an evacuee and instructions on how to survive an air raid, alongside reading our class book 'Goodnight Mister Tom'.
