Despite facing many challenges, Emmeline worked hard to lead the Suffragettes to success and is remembered for her huge influence on women's rights.

Block 2 Review:

Over the last 10 weeks, we explored the question 'How do our actions shape the world?' We studied the Amazon Rainforest in both Geography and Literacy and considered the impact of human actions on nature. We loved reading our class book 'The Explorer' and enjoyed our explorer day, where we had to survive in the rainforest after a plane crash! We created some wonderful writing including instructions on how to survive in the rainforest and even had a go at writing our own explorer inspired stories!

Block 3:

Over the next 10 weeks we will be studying space and the solar system. In addition to learning about planets, stars, and galaxies, it is essential to understand the history of space exploration, including the remarkable individuals who played crucial roles,

often unnoticed. Our enquiry question for this block will be 'Why should everyone have the chance to explore space and follow their dreams, no matter who they are?'

Their achievements not only advanced our understanding of the cosmos but also symbolize the importance of **equality**, **dreams**, **fairness**, and **change** in shaping the future of space exploration and inspiring young minds to reach for the stars.

P.E & outdoor learning

P.E. will take place every **Tuesday** and **Friday**. Children will need to wear their full PE kits to school on these days.

Outdoor Learning:

For the first 10 weeks, the children will be participating in Outdoor Learning sessions on a **Tuesday**. The children will need:

<u>Reading</u>

In Year 5 pupils are expected to read for **20 minutes** every evening. They must note in their reading record books what they have read. The reading records will be collected in on a **Tuesday** and **Friday** so they can be checked in order for us to monitor the children's reading – pupils will have two reading books sent home. If they complete a book, it will be changed on a Tuesday or Friday by staff. There is a box in class for pupils to place their completed book and reading record on those days. We ask that you try to listen to your child read daily and discuss what they have been reading and also sign their reading record weekly.

In addition, children will be set homework on Reading Eggspress every **Friday** and due in for the following **Thursday**.



<u>Spelling</u>

- Children will be given spelling words to learn on a **Monday** and will be tested on these words the following **Monday**.

Spelling homework is in the dark blue spelling book. Children need to pick two activities from the spelling activities list to complete each week.

<u>Maths</u>

This year the children will receive a weekly maths task set in their homework journals. The children continue to have access to TTRockstars which they can logon and use to aid their knowledge of times tables.

Maths homework will be set on a Friday and due in for the following Tuesday.
